Lily Plots***Red Lily Beetle Update***

The Lily Leaf Beetle (a.k.a. Red Lily Beetle), *Lilioceris lili* is moving across Canada. Here is an update on controlling this pest. This is an abstract of a paper presented at the recent Entomology Society Canada Meeting in Vancouver 2010.

Biological Control of the Lily Leaf Beetle.

The lily leaf beetle, *Lilioceris lili*, has spread into five Canadian provinces in the 60 years since its introduction into North America. It is a serious pest of native and ornamental lilies and a candidate for biological control given this it is well regulated by larval parasitoids, not only at natural site but also in private gardens and lily plantations.

The most suitable species, the eulophid

Tetrastichus setifer was recently approved by CFIA for release in Canada. Here we present long-term data on parasitism in Europe and implications for biological control in Canada.

What disease problems (if any) plague your lilies?

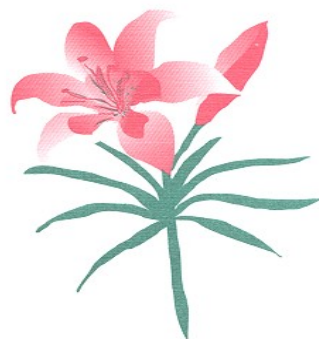
